### **CLASS DESCRIPTION**

This will a four-week class on Thursdays from February 18th through March 10th, 2016. You may sign up for the entire four weeks or just sign up for one the weeks which features you something in which you are interested. Classes are appropriate for both the beginner and for someone looking to get a tune on quilting skills.

Week 1: The Basics-Introductions, sewing machine care, tools, safety, rulers. Blocks-Nine Patch, Double Nine Patch, and Rail Fence

Week 2: Show and Tell of homework, Triangles and the color wheel. Blocks, Shoo Fly and Double X

Week 3: Double X, Irish Chain, Log Cabin, Hole in the Barn and Ohio Star

Week 4: Sashing and block arrangement, Variable Star, Diamond in a Square and Card Trick.

## MATERIALS LIST:

Beginning Quilting classes start on 2/18 and continue on 2/25, 3/3 and 3/10/16.

The class is designed for those that have a working knowledge of their machine and would like to learn the fundamentals of quilting. Each class will work with basic quilt patterns from the basic Four Patch to the Card Trick. We will also touch on sewing machine care, safety, fabric selection, color, value, design, tools of the trade and one or two shortcuts.

- Sewing machine in working order
- Sewing machine manual
- Bobbins to fit your machine
- sewing machine needles, sizes 10, 14, 70, 90 will work for piecing
- Selection of fabric (solids and prints, 1/2 to 1 yard each, your choice) in a color range that is pleasing to you. You may want to coordinate the colors with the blocks you made in the beginning class. At the end of this class series you should have enough finished blocks for a small sampler quilt.

- Scissors a good pair will be your friend for a long time. I have a small pair for close work and at east one 8" bent handle pair. These are FABRIC scissors, NOT paper scissors.
- Thread-cotton or polyester. If you can bring one each and see which one you prefer. Match your fabrics or use a neutral shade for piecing. This is up to you. Once you're hooked on quilting one color is never enough
- Rotary cutter-one that has replaceable blades. A 45MM cutter is a good starter size.
- Cutting mat-try to acquire one with a grid, possibly self healing. Size-18" x 12" or 18" x 24" will work for this class.
- See Thru ruler with a measured grid-The grids help in lining up your fabric before you cut. 24"x6 " or 18" x 3" are good for cutting strips. A 6" x 6" or 6 1/2" x 6 1/2" are a must when you are squaring up your block pieces and finished block. There are rulers of just about any size you want and/or need. These are suggestions for those who are just starting.
- Regular sewing pins or glass headed pins. The glass ones are easy to pick up and you can iron over them and they do not melt all over your fabric
- Pin Cushion
- Thimble
- And not to be forgotten, because you will use it no matter what level of quilting you strive for....a SEAM RIPPER. Yes, there are times when un-sewing is needed.
- We will have irons, ironing boards and design boards ready for you.
