There were squares of fabric and squares of Insulbrite to use for making pot holders.

Some people made small cord holders with snap closures.





Another option that some people liked were the marble mazes, made out of fabric to keep young fingers busy.

We played Quilto again and won some nice prizes.



It was pretty rainy while we were there, so there were fewer times for walks, but the hot tub was enclosed, and it was a good place to soak our sore quilting muscles!
