Double Wedding Ring Class with Jeri Kennedy



The Double Wedding Quilt Pattern is an iconic pattern first published in the US in 1928. It's been a favorite wedding gift and passed from mothers to daughters throughout the years. Aside from the obvious symbolism, it is prized because of the apparent complexity in the design.

The truth is that it's not as difficult as it appears! This class will introduce you to a wonderful method using accurate templates, correct fabric marking and a little patience enabling you to create your own heirloom. Here's what you need to get the most out of this class:

1) Please visit The Loft and sign up for the class. Maryse has the supply list. The class is free to all guild members and open to the community, but we ask that you purchase your background fabric (a minimum of 3-1/2" yards) and any other supplies you might need at The Loft. It's very important that we support our local shop.

2) The class is split into two parts. In the morning, we will cut and mark our fabric for sewing using templates that Jeri will provide. In the afternoon, we will chain-piece the scarps and put enough blocks together that you may finish the top on your own.

3) Plan on spending the entire day with us!

April 15 – Guild meeting with a lecture "A Journey through Mountain Mist" **and trunk show** presented by Jeri Kennedy. Guild mtg social time from 12:30 – 1:00; Guild meeting starts at 1:00, followed by lecture and trunk show.

Mountain Mist is a very well-known name in quilt batting. You can find it just about anywhere, in cotton or polyester rolled up in plastic or packaged as a pre-made pillow form. It's so common, you might have overlooked the name and the very interesting back story behind the product.

Jeri Kennedy, a new guild member, studies the history of Mountain Mist and the impact of this product on the quilt making community. She has collected all of the known patterns produced by Mountain Mist's marketing department and researched the origins of some of the designs. Jeri's lecture will introduce us to the men who revolutionized the manufacture of quilt batting, the creative team who brought this improved product to market and the marketing scheme that ushered in the prolific quilt making period of the 1930's.

Jeri's presentation will include a trunk show of Mountain Mist patterns, tops and quilts made by the artists of "The Mountain Mist Club".

May 20 – Guild meeting and lecture by guild member, Charlotte Teftt displaying and describing her Character dolls. More details to follow.
