Drop in and Sew, 11-4 at GAC. COME SEW WITH US!

September 13 and September 14 – Workshops (2) with Sarah Goer

1. "Planned Improv: Scrappy Squares," Wednesday, September 13th, from 9:30-4:00.







Description: This scrap friendly workshop is a great opportunity to explore improv piecing. We'll follow a set of guidelines involving measurement and specific cutting rules to create the puzzle pieces students will use to design and create their own unique improv slab. Students will leave with their first finished improv slab (approximately 18" x 20"), which can become a finished mini quilt or built upon for a larger project. Quilting ideas will be discussed.

NOTIONS AND TOOLS: Sewing machine 1/4-inch presser foot Neutral thread Scissors or snips Rotary cutter Cutting mat Acrylic cutting rulers (I prefer a 6-1/2" x 6-1/2" and a 12-1/2" x 12-1/2".) Small Design Wall Straight pins (optional) Pencil Graph paper (print attached page, if needed)

FABRIC:

• Feature fabrics: coordinating scraps in a variety of sizes, the largest of which is about 10" square. These can be in one color, or a variety of colors (see notes below). Equivalent to 1/2-1 yard.

• Scraps or yardage to use for the background. More larger pieces are helpful. Equivalent to 1/2-1 yard. It is important that there is high contrast between your pile of feature fabrics and your pile of background fabrics. Ideas for choosing fabric:

Feature:

- Single color family (solids, blenders, prints, or a mix)
- Two colors next to each other on the color wheel (ex. blue and green)
- A single fabric line (layer cake friendly)
- 2-3 bold prints and coordinating solids and/or blenders
- 1/2 yard of a single neutral or solid
- Variety of neutrals (ex: low volume prints, whites, whites/off-whites, light greys, or blacks)
- A contrasting color from the opposite side of the color wheel
- Consider using your bold color as the background and use neutrals for your feature fabrics

2. The Thursday, September 14th workshop will be **Building an Improv Toolbox** from 9:30-4:00. Description: In this fast-paced workshop, Sarah will teach a wide variety of improvisational piecing techniques. Discover how fun and easy it is to create these improv elements for use in your existing quilt projects, or as the start of a new project. Each prompt will be introduced and demonstrated; then time will be allowed for making one or more units with each technique.

NOTIONS AND TOOLS: (Same as workshop 1)

FABRIC:

• For a small quilt (approx. wall hanging) select 6 fat quarter. If you would like to make a larger quilt (baby/ lap/etc.) choose larger cuts of fabric or 10-12 coordinating fat quarters. For a large project, you may prefer to have yardage of a coordinating fabric to use throughout your project.

- Choose a variety of values (dark, med-dark, med-light, light) for a dynamic composition.
- Layer cakes or jelly rolls can be utilized.
- No precutting is necessary.

Sisters Outdoor Quilt Show 2023







"On the road again with my wonderful travel companion, Kevin and I set out for Sisters, Oregon to experience the 48th Annual Sisters Outdoor Quilt Show! The event is designed to "celebrate the art, skill, and heritage of quilting and fiber arts." It is scheduled the second Saturday of July every year. The week leading up to the show is full of classes and lectures featuring many inspiring artists. This is all orchestrated by Stitchin' Post, the local quilters shop operated by Jean Wells and her enthusiastic crew. This year the classes and ticketed events were posted in January. This year's theme was "Hidden Stories", which conjures up a plethora of reasons why we love to quilt.

When I asked my husband if he would be my buddy on this Sisters adventure, I got his usual positive response, "Sure, what a great opportunity!" I signed up early for notifications, and when the registration came available in January, I jumped on it! I took a class on Thursday and Friday, and Kevin and I attended "funraising" events in the evenings with wonderful presenters and trunk shows. Lots to see and do! All of the classes were located at the local high school with easy access, excellent lunches easily ordered before class, a giant commons to mingle with fellow quilters, and an on-site shop with supplies related to the many classes. The evening events were held in the main auditorium off the commons. We were in "Quilters Heaven"!

In preparation for the actual day of the Sisters Outdoor Quilt Show, a multitude of volunteers participated in an amazing logistical plan to get all 1,100 quilts hung by 7:30 AM on Saturday! The volunteers were many locals and interested supporters, including the local fire department. Quilts were hung everywhere! High and low on the outside of shops, restaurants, between trees and every imaginable space. What a sight to see! Kevin and I traversed every block of the little town of Sisters, taking in the designs, color choices, skilled artistry and creativity from all over the USA and abroad. We met many delightful groups of friends exploring and sharing this quilting paradise together.
