What is a Japanese Rice Bag? Komebukuro, a patchwork drawstring bag used in Japan to carry rice or beans to temples or shrines during festivals as an offering. Japanese Rice Bags were often made of repurposed indigo fabric with sashiko or boro hand stiching. Today, Rice bags are often used as purses, totes, or storage for art and craft projects. There are many on-line examples and patterns.



Description: Two-day workshop for making a square lined fabric bag. There are four pieced panels and one bottom for the outside of the bag. There are five squares for the lining. Bags may vary in size, but each finished panel should be the same size. Example: 9"X9", 10"x10" depending on how large you want to make your bag. The month between the two workshop dates, participants will have time to embellish their panels with decorative stitching, lace, buttons, photos or other notions. No purchased pattern is required.

Day One, **Thursday, March 20**, we will be piecing the four outside panels. Day Two, **Thursday, April 17**, we will be constructing the lining and the bag.

They were shipped to The Quilt Emporium in Woodland Hills, California, through a contact that Jeri Kennedy connected us with. She will let us know all the important details soon, but it certainly sounds like they are very appreciated! Thank you for all your selfless contributions.

Report from Jeri Kennedy: Pacific Piecemakers Send Comfort Quilts to Fire Victims

Last week, The Quilt Emporium of Woodland Hills, CA, received PPQG's gift of several beautiful comfort quilts. Lisa Hanson, shop owner, agreed to coordinate these donations on behalf of the quilt guild. Lisa explained that the quilts are picked up weekly by a volunteer working with FEMA. This single FEMA volunteer contacts the quilt shop, a designated church, and other charitable organizations around Southern California to fulfill "orders" of needed items. She transports the items to locations in Santa Monica and Pasadena where FEMA and the County of Los Angeles have set up support centers. There, identified fire victims come to get assistance in completing paperwork, and to receive their essentials. They are also offered quilts and other things that will help set up their new (temporary) home.

In thanking PPQG, Lisa wrote: "Oh my goodness!! Thank you soooo much for the wonderful quilts from the Pacific Piecemakers! I'm very excited to get these into new homes. The woman in charge reports that when she tells fire victims there will be a quilt for them, their faces just soften." Makes my heart so happy!" I hope that your heart is happy too!

Challenge 2025

The Pacific Piecemakers Quilt Guild is set to present our Annual Quilt Challenge, "Inspiration is: Our Local Quilt Shop." This year's creative endeavor challenges participants to incorporate a featured fabric from the Loft, a cherished local fabric store in downtown Gualala. The exhibit will commence with an opening reception on Friday, May 9, from 4 -6 pm, and will be on display through June 8, 2025, in the Gualala Arts Jacob Foyer and Burnett Gallery. This showcase celebrates local quilters' artistry and craftsmanship and reinforces the bond between the arts and local businesses.

Rules: 1. Any design, any size quilt.

- 2. Use one or more of the four fabrics chosen for this challenge. The challenge fabric(s) must be purchased at the Loft. The fabrics chosen are for their simplicity and versatility. The fabric line is "Thatch" in the colorways: Plum, Turquoise, Royal, Heather.
- 3. Purchase one or more featured fabrics in a minimum ½ yard cut.
- 4. Use as much of the featured challenge fabric as you like but at least one of the challenge fabrics must be recognizable within your challenge quilt top.
- 5. Print your name on your challenge-fabric purchase receipt. It must be from the Loft. Save it.
- 6. Turn in a fabric purchase receipt with each of your finished quilt(s) on the Challenge "turn-in" date 5/7/2025. One receipt per person per quilt. Do not attach your receipt to your registration form. Your receipt will be placed into a drawing for a "Tula Pink mini-Oliso Iron" or an "Accuquilt Go! Me" fabric cutter with a 5" finished square die. Note: A Guild member donated the prizes for our Challenge.
- 7. The 2025 Challenge will also include the opportunity for the community to vote for a "Viewer's Choice." The quilt chosen as the Viewer's Choice will receive a ribbon and its maker will receive a gift certificate from the Loft.
- 8. All Artists exhibiting their artwork at Gualala Arts must be current Gualala Arts members.
