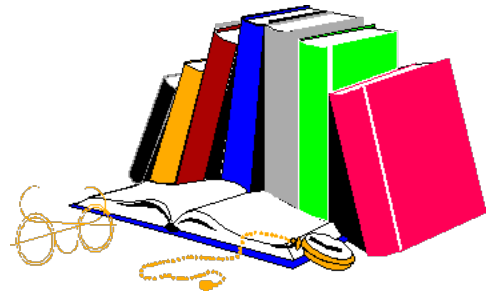

CHALLENGE 2008

In the 2008 Challenge Show we have thirty-seven wonderful quilts from twenty-seven members. The variety of quilts and ways in which people have used the theme "I Found it in the Library," is fun to see. Many used quilting books, but others were inspired by books on travel, sea life, music, children's books, even a game from the newspaper.

We have had two firsts this year, one being the Ultimate Guild Challenge, in which we have thirteen entries. With the help of Janet Sears and Lola DeLongoria we have used this as an opportunity to learn more about the judging of quilts.

A vote of the members selected eight quilts to represent the guild. All of the quilts received numerous votes, but the top eight are "Sticks II," Janet Windsor, "River Run," Karen Shanower, "Buckbeak's Return," Donna Blum, "The Law of Attraction," Lola DeLongoria, "A World of Friends," Anna Hines, "Shy Beauty," Janet Sears, "Across the River," Judy Castleton, and "R. Countess of Haddington," Babs Levine. Photos of these quilts will be submitted to the American Quilters' Society and, if selected, will be shown as a group at Quilt Expo 2008 in Nashville in August.

The other first was the entry fee of \$10.00 for quilts that were not for sale. Fifteen of the quilts were NFS, which gives Gualala Arts \$150 toward gallery expenses. Of the remaining twenty-two quilts, three have been sold so far.

Thanks to everyone who served on the Challenge 2008 Committee and helped get the show up, including Laura Hamilton, Polly Dakin, Iris Lorenz-Fife, Janet Sears, Lola DeLongoria, Janet Windsor, and Gail Sims, as well as a few (very) helpful husbands.

Thanks also to all who entered the wonderful quilts to make this a successful show, to those who participated in the opening celebration, and to the Guild for giving me this opportunity to get to know you all better.

For those picking up quilts on Monday, April 7, it would be great if you can get there between 10:00 a.m. or shortly after. If not, please let me know.
